CW SS DIARY 1985 de Nike Colesante, KC8C (thanks to N8II for the inspiration)

As has been the case for the past two years, I trekked back to my home state of West Virginia to operate the 1985 CW Sweepstakes from the QTH of N8II. 1983 and 1984 had been frustrating due to a varied set of problems. 1983 found me right with the leaders at sleeptime only to have a drunk driver take out a power pole one hour after I got on in the morning and leave us without power for three hours. 1984 found me with a blown front end coil in one of the TS-830s, which wasn't realized until the damage to the rate was done.

This year I was determined to go through without problems. I ventured up to Jeff's one weekend in October to help with some antenna work and to be sure everything was in shape. One of the things we did was to replace the 40 meter dipole with a quad loop. This didn't seem to do the trick, possibly due to the bottom being quite near the ground. A Delta loop was also tried with similarly disappointing results, so the dipole was put back up. It served quite well as will be seen. We also replaced Jeff's 80 meter wire vertical with one made of tubing, which went up on the third try looking like a piece of saturated vermicelli.

Friday before the contest arrives and I'm raring to go. I do my grocery shopping at lunchtime in order to have as much time as possible on Saturday to relax. I arrive at Jeff's about 6:30 and after pizza we spend the rest of the evening discussing the previous weekend's WW SSB test.

It was good to tune across the bands during the ARRL CW contest and hear so many PVRC calls. Scotty KØDQ at W3GRF, and Fred K3ZO, battled it out for top single operator/all band honors on the national level with ex-PVRCer John, KlAR. The final outcome won't be known for some time, but it looks like Scotty might have won it for the country, with John and Fred very close behind. Both Scotty and Fred had a QSO count up around 1700. John was around 1600, but seems to have enough multipliers to make up the difference.

How many times have two hams in the same small suburb (Temple Hills) come in the top three like this? Congratulations to all three of you for a superb job.

While the propagation seems to favor areas south of New England this time, apparently it wasn't far enough south to help the crew at W3LPL. They reported generally poor conditions, and several multi/multi's appear to have done a little better, led by N2ME (at the QTH of K3JLT).

There were several other multi-operator stations active during ARRL CW in various classes, such as those at K3ZZ and W3USS. And I'm sorry I don't have anything near a complete list of single operators so I won't even try to mention all of the efforts here. I hope you'll check into the PVRC net after each contest so that I'll know the extent of your activity. I know from our first net this week that we had as many people listening without checking in as actually checked in. Come on in and share your impressions of conditions and what you've picked up on scores.

On the subject of a new meeting site, I'm sorry to report that I have not been able to compile a list of proposed sites and a questionnaire in time for this mailing. As many of you know, a death in my family has kept me tied up quite a bit this last month, and preparation for the CW and phone contests has used up a significant amount of time. LOG DUPING ON THE APPLE COMPUTER AT W3FG, THE FIRST TWO YEARS de Walt McGugan, W3FG

(Alternate title: HOW TO AVOID TAKING OUT THE GARBAGE)

Not all that long ago, the "High Speed Dash" was an integral part of the goings-on at the W3LPL multi - multi station immediately following the end of a major DX contest. Being a new member of the W3LPL crew at the time, I figured everyone was in a hurry to pack up their rig and load their car so they could rush back in to hear the claimed scores starting to come in on both 2 meters and the HF gathering frequency. (In the words of APPLESOFT, Apple's name for it's BASIC Programming language, this is referred to as a LOGICAL ERROR). I soon learned from experience that the object of the "High Speed Dash" was to disappear before Frank could shove a stack of logs and a piece of paper at you and say "Dupe these!" Being the proud owner of a new Apple //e system, I accepted the task. After all, this is the kind of thing home computers should be great at. A few lines of BASIC code, and the log could be duped in no time. No

problem! (LOGICAL ERROR #2). The way I looked at it, log duping should be a fairly straightforward process. The duping program I planned would let you type in callsigns from the keyboard. The program would then store the calls in a string (A string is computer talk for a variable that contains alpha-numeric data as opposed to numbers). Every so often, say every 100 QSOs or so, the program should check for dupes. I did this by comparing a callsign to each one typed in before it. This procedure turned out to be very inefficient, but easy to program. Besides, at the time I didn't know  $\odot$ any better. If the program found a dupe, a plus sign (+) was added at the beginning of the callsign and a message was displayed on the monitor stating where in the log the dupe was found. The callsigns were written to disk every so often to prevent all of your work from being lost if the power failed. This also meant you didn't have to type in an entire band's worth of callsigns in one sitting. After typing in all the callsigns and identifying the dupes, the file containing the calls would be sorted. callsigns with a plus sign in front of them (the dupes) would sort to the Then, using a few simple lines of code to format the output text,

would be the dupesheet that is turned in with your contest logs. The BASIC code for all of the above was fairly easy to write. Rather than re-invent the wheel, I searched through a few magazines looking for a sort routine. I found an article called "WONDER SORT". Sounded good to me! Before writing the full duping program, I typed in the "WONDER SORT" routine (which was written in BASIC) and tested it with 25 random callsigns. The routine sorted them in less than 2 seconds! I figured 1000 callsigns would therefore take no more than 80 seconds or so to sort. (LOGICAL ERROR #3).

After typing in my duping program. I started with the W3LPL 20 meter logs -- about 1000 or so QSOs. Things ran smoothly, and fairly quickly, for the first few hundred QSOs, but started to slow down after that. My

#### President's Notes

We had a great meeting in March. Before our normal discussion about the normal and the abnormal that each of us experienced during the ARRL DX tests we discussed needed reform of the PVRC contest (five million) awards program and began discussing a plan for long-term financial stability in view of our steadily diminishing treasury. We also continued our discussion on meeting site for 1986 - '87.

#### The ARRL SSB DX Contest

Bob Cox, K3EST, related some interesting tales of TVI and moving the entire PJOB station <u>during</u> the contest. Bob and the other two operators still averaged about 160 QSOs per hour despite the problems, of course.

The crew at Frank's M/M W3LPL ended up with 2397 QSOs, 428 mults, for about 3.1 million. This was the last operation from the "old" W3LPL. The new one, with more antennas and towers, is already well along and Frank promises that it will be finished by summer's end. See the news article included on another page. The article demonstrates that basically fair and balanced news can be presented - a credit to both the newspaper and to Frank's obviously successful discussion with the reporter. At last word all was calm in Howard County.

Other excellent ARRL SSB all-band scores from around the club include that of Fred, K3ZO, with about 1675/303 and a shot at second place nationally, behind K1KI up in New England; N2FB estimated at 1400/275; K3ZJ 1000/250; W3HHG 635/191; N3JT 603/160; Fifteen meter single band scores: K3RV perhaps on top nationally with 960/115; and N8II 690/98.

Quite a few others were on, and I hope that all of you sent your scores into the ARRL, and on a summary sheet that credited the "PVRC".

#### Finances

At the last meeting we began thinking about a problem: we are paying out more to just mail the newsletter than we have received in 1986 dues. While we do have a little cushion, this is solely due to the fact that we have a little money still left over from the repeater. But that is

disappearing fast. At the present dues rate we need <u>72</u> paid members minimum just to cover the newsletter. Other recurring obligations include plaques and awards in our own program (the 5 million award), a massive mailing for the PVRC reunion, our annual clock award, and the Tom Peruzzi W4BVV and Vic Clark W4KFC contest awards.

Over the next couple of months we will be discussing this at meetings. The officers also solicit your ideas and suggestions, either at meetings or by mail or telephone. (My address is on the ballot, below.)

If you are interested in contesting, we hope that PVRC membership is worth the \$10 and that you will help us by sending in your dues even if you generally don't make the meetings. While I personally think the meetings are the best part of club membership, Walt and I have worked hard on improving this club newsletter so that it will be informative and helpful to our members. The improvement will continue, and I hope more of you will help by writing a small piece for us. Send these directly to Walt at the address on the first page of every newsletter.

I do want to clarify that thanks to Fred's hospitality this year the meetings are not a major expense. And the Christmas dinner was self-supporting. Our major expense is for printing and mailing this newsletter, and our other expenses are as noted above.

My purpose in bringing this to your attention is to inform all of you as to the club's status and solicit your suggestions, whether in person at our next meeting or by mail. My address is on noted on the ballot, below.

By next September we must have a plan by which to live within our means. Either some of the things we are doing must be cut, and close to 100% of club expenses are for what I have listed above, or we have to raise more money. Should we cut? Should we raise dues? Should we take up collections at meetings when we have spent more than planned for the previous quarter? Obtain tax-free status and see if a benefactor or two might contribute more than dues (which are not tax deductible in any event) to help PVRC? What are the other possibilities?

The time to work through this is now, while we still have an albeit diminishing cushion. I hope it doesn't come to no awards, no reunion, and 14-cent postcard meeting notices instead of this bulletin. What are your ideas?

SCORING - Only completed 2-way contacts count and are worth 2 points. Stations may be worked once on each rallying frequency. Multiplier is the sum of STATES (plus DC), VE provinces, and DXCC countries worked. The US and CANADA do not count as countries. Hawaii and Alaska may be counted as either states or countries, but not both. The District of Columbia counts as a multiplier. Multipliers count only once, NOT band by band. FINAL SCORE is GSO points times state-province-country multiplier.

EXCHANGE - Serial number, your call, state/province/country, your call when you joined FVRC, and the last two digits of your first year in FVRC. Example - NR 1 N3GB MD WA3TOE 76.

REUNION CALL - CQ PVRC.

Ray Kowalski will briefly bring us up to date on FCC actions. Ray is Chief of the Special Services Division of the FCC's Private Radio Bureau. In English, that translates to "where the decisions are made" on most amateur regulatory matters.

At least two recent FCC actions are of direct interest to contesters and DXers. 1) Recently the FCC, at ARRL's request, proposed to grant novices voice (ssb) privileges on the low end of 10 meters, i.e., 28.300 - 28.500 MHz. 2) Also, although not within Ray's responsibility, the FCC recently denied an ARRL petition to implement the Goldwater RFI law by requiring RFI susceptibility labels on consumer electronic equipment. If you have any questions or comments about any FCC regulatory or enforcement actions, here's your chance to learn the latest status of pending items and politely tell him what's right, or wrong, as you see it.

Last meeting was held at K3ZO's QTH. Andy, W3XE, will take over from Fred, K3ZO, as treasurer. June meeting will be Fred's last before he QSY's to his new post in Managua.

The last meeting was really a party to extend our best wishes to Fred and his new bride. Highlight of the meeting was toasting the newly-married couple with champaign.

Fred then led a discussion on the current situation with amateur radio licensing in Thailand, from which he had just returned, and in other Southeast Asia countries. HSJA will be active in all contests, and soon many more HS stations should be on the air if all goes well.

The following was received from John Crovelli, W2GD, who, operating as VP2MGD, won the Single Operator, North America CW plaque aponsored by the PVRC in the 1985 ARRL DX CW contest.

I just received the Single Operator, North America CW plaque for the 1985 ARRL DX Contest during which I operated from the island of Montserrat as VP2MGD. It is truly a beautiful award and it will find a good home on the wall of my new ham shack.

A little background on the trip. It was a family vacation planned just after the 1984 CQWW CW contest. I originally rented a house owned by Chod Harris, VP2ML, but local problems with the caretaker necessitated finding alternate lodgings upon arrival on Montaerrat. Bobby and Mae Martin, VP2MO and VP2MN, were extremely helpful and we eventually took a residence at a home on the western side of the island owned by VE1YX. The house came with an A-3 tribander at 30 feet. I managed to put up a 38 foot mast from which inverted vees for 160, 80 and 40 were mounted. A 600 foot listening wire was strung out down the road. The location offered a panoramic view of the Carribean, the house being 450 feet above the sea and one half mile inland. Equipment consisted of a TS83OS and an NLA25OO linear. I also had an FT757 and SB2OO available for backup.

#### **PVRC Contests**

September traditionally is the beginning of the contest season. I have been noting the major contests at the beginning of the newsletter so that you might try some "little ones" in preparation for the "big ones": CQ WW SSB is the first of the PVRC club competition contests, and this year will be held October 25-26. Sweepstakes CW is November 1-2, Sweepstakes phone November 15-16, and CQ WW CW is November 29-30. This is the heart of PVRC's club competitions -- only the ARRL DX contests in Feb./Mar. remain. (We do encourage participation in the N.A. Sprints, see below, and the CQ WPX contests, but traditionally we make our maximum efforts in CQ WW, SS, & ARRL DX.)

This year we are organizing to get PVRC members on the air. All members are requested to fill out and return the short questionnaire included with this newsletter. If we don't hear from you, you'll hear from us. We hope you'll join in our club contest activities for as many weekends as possible. After the contests we'll be collecting scores on the 147.00 repeater. Also, on the Monday nights following the four DX contest weekends we will have a roundtable discussion at 8 p.m. to compare notes and collect more scores. For all three contests (six weekends) PVRC will submit logs directly to the sponsors, so you are requested to bring your log to the meeting immediately following the contest, or to mail it to me. The logs will be transferred directly to the sponsor. While you don't have to take advantage of this service, we do have the means to ensure prompt receipt and acknowledgement of the logs beyond merely mailing it to a general address.

PVRC is first and foremost a contest club. Please join us on the air for our operating weekends.

#### **PVRC Awards**

In addition to the PVRC 5-million award, we want to initiate new club awards for each of the six contests. This will be on the agenda for the October meeting, in addition to a panel discussion on preparing for and operating in the CQ WW SSB and sweepstakes contests.

The call for candidates went out in the last newsletter. Proposed for 1986-'87 are: President K3ZJ; Vice-president WA3TAI; Secretary KC8C; and Treasurer W3XE. This is a rerun of last year's officers, except for Andy.

#### North American Sprint Contests by Bob Peterson, W3YY

The next CW Sprint contest is Saturday, September 13, and the next SSB Sprint Saturday, September 20. Please volunteer to join the PVRC team(s). These contests, held twice a year, in September and February, are sponsored by the National Contest Journal (NCJ). Separate SSB and CW contests are held during each of these months. The contests are unique in several aspects which make them particularly interesting. If you're not familiar with this contest, check out the rules (enclosed) and you'll see what I mean.

First, the contests are short. Each contest is only four hours long. Anyone can put in a full effort without sacrificing an entire weekend or even a day. The contests run from 0000 through 0359 UTC, so you don't even lose any sleep.

Second, the contests have a unique "QSY rule" to keep stations moving and prevent them from just sitting on a frequency and running stations. You have to experience this aspect of the contest firsthand to really appreciate the excitement it adds to the event.

Third, the contest has a regular following of hardcore contest types and great operators. While the contest is for everyone, there's no doubt that the "cream of the crop" tend to be represented in these events. If you want to operate in a small contest with some of the best operators around, this is the contest for you.

From the standpoint of the PVRC, these contests give the club a chance for some important recognition. Our club used to enter teams in these events, but not recently. I think the time has come to change. Judging from recent Sprint results, and our known capabilities, PVRC could regularly place among the top four teams if we made a reasonable effort. This would be notable, considering the fact that Midwest and West Coast stations seem to enjoy an advantage over the East Coast in this contest.

The September CW Sprint will be held at 0000 through 0359 UTC on September 14 (Saturday night, Sept. 13, 8:00 - 11:59 p.m. local time). The SSB Sprint is the following weekend at the same time. I will be organizing and registering PVRC teams for each of these contests. If we get more than ten entrants, additional teams will be formed. I think it would be great if PVRC could regularly enter 2 or 3 teams, with team #1 comprised of those members who provided the 10 best scores in the previous Sprint.

Let me know if you'd like to participate. If you're interested in operating only one mode, that's fine, since the SSB and CW contests are entirely separate events. Please contact me at (703) 830-1480 (home) or (202) 376-7447 or 485-1766 (work). I'm looking forward to hearing from you and seeing you in my Sprint log this September.

# Snagging Extra Multipliers Via Grayline Propagation Dave Pascoe KM3T

One of the most frequently overlooked modes of propagation during the DX contests is grayline propagation. The reasons vary from operator to operator, but usually include:

- . Incorrectly oriented antennas
- . Lack of knowledge of a possible path
- . Lack of faith in one's antenna system
- . Getting on the band at the wrong time
- . Lack of belief that stations will be active.

The purpose of this short article is to provide information on the paths that may be workable during the CQ WW DX Contests. One could obtain information for other dates by using such devices as The Dx Edge or simply by computing sunrise and sunset times for locations thought to have a path between them.

Experience has shown that most contacts are made by using long-path great circle The frequency bearings. bands of interest in this part of the sunspot cycle are generally 1.8 MHz, 3.5 MHz, 7 MHz and occasionally 14 MHz. Most stations are not equipped to take full advantage of the openings on 1.8 MHz and 3.5 MHz, but many are equipped for 7 MHz. Because of the high activity on this band, most of the

juicy multipliers will be found here.

The CQ WW DX CW contest during the last full weekend of November provides the best long-path openings. These usually occur around our local sunset. Any station with a directional antenna on 40m has the potential to get in on these openings because signals are usually strong. The reason for this is that most of the long-path to Asia and the Far East is over salt During short-path water. openings in the morning to those areas we have to work through the polar absorption and much rougher terrain, which tends to weaken signals.

Openings are possible during our sunrise period to various areas but the stateside activity is usually higher at that time. This increased activity sometimes makes it difficult to get through the pileups. There is another side to that coin, however.

Increased activity can tend to attract rare DX stations who may be casually tuning a band. CQs by a well-equipped stateside station can yield interesting contacts. Operating 40m from N3RS, a multi-multi operation in the 1986 ARRL DX CW Contest, I can remember having JA5BJC and YB5ASO answer a series of CQs with the 2 el 40m beam pointed Their signals did not SE. have the polar flutter

usually noticed when working them on the short-path.

A problem that discourages many operators from trying to use the grayline is the low number of DX stations actually capable of putting out a good signal in the required direction. This is a problem that could be countered by making on-the-air skeds with active stations prior to the contest. This is difficult, though, since the bands are crowded during the contests.

There isn't really too much more that a contest operator needs to know in order to use grayline propagation. The biggest problem, at least with single-op entrants, is that one can spend too much time hunting for DX on the long path when another band might be yielding high QSO rates. This is always a tradeoff anyway, though.



#### CHRISTMAS DINNER

Our annual Christmas dinner will be held on Tuesday, December 9th at the Officers' Club at Fort Myer (Arlington), Virginia. This is a location close to D.C. and fairly equidistant for members residing on the north or south edges of our club territory. A cash bar will open at 6:30, to be followed by a roast beef dinner at 7:30. Cost is \$16. per person. Please reserve as soon as possible by sending the below form to Andy, W3XE. Your reservation will facilitate our arrangements.

Our speaker will be Jim Talens, N3JT, who will describe his recent trek to San Andres Island for a CQ WW SSB operation from the QTH of HKOBKX as N3JT/HKO. Jim's tales will interest non-hams as well as contesters, so please bring your spouse or friend to this yearly gathering. Jim increasingly has been making big noises on the bands, winning Virginia in the 1985 SS phone contest and making over 4800 QSOs during the 1986 CQ WW phone contest from San Andres. In real life Jim, who is both a communications attorney and engineer, is Chief of the Domestic Services Branch of the FCC's Common Carrier Bureau.

#### 1986 CQ WORLDWIDE SSB CONTEST

A lot of RF radiation was observed being emitted from PVRC member stations during the annual CQ Worldwide SSB contest. Despite predictions for poor conditions, propagation once again was excellent. The solar flux stayed in the 90's, the geomagnetic activity remained low, and even ten meters opened to Europe while 15 and 20 meters were end-to-end bedlam with all the contest activity.

All PVRC members' activity has not reached me, but it is clear that we were well represented on the bands. On the DXpedition scene we were ably represented by Jim, N3JT, operating N3JT/HKO to the tune of 4800 QSOs single op. despite problems with the 40/80/160 antenna on San Andres Island. And Jack, N4RV, was heard with a group signing PJlB from Bonaire.

Locally, multi/multi W3LPL was inaugurated, to the tune of 7.8 million points. In the single band/single op. categories, Carl, K3RV, may have won 15 meters for the U.S., with in the neighborhood of an incredible 1900 QSOs. On 20 meters, K3ZJ racked up about 1275 QSOs using a single 204BA.

Three top scores were made in the single op./all band category. Wayne, N2FB, beat out KM3T & K3NA for the PVRC championship in this tough category. A great job by Wayne, Dave, and Eric. Larry, W3HHC also made about 780 QSOs in a good effort, and W3MR reports around 638K points. In the QRP category, K3wS will rank near if not at the top worldwide, completing 450 QSOs using only an Argonaut (less than 5 watts). Also heard on the bands: K4YF, W3IUU, KE9A, K3WUW, W3CNQ, and W3YY.

#### SEPTEMBER MEETING

VOTED in as members were KE9A, WP4J, and W9LT. Welcome!

A discussion concerning membership criteria was held. This discussion was totally unrelated to the particular membership applications presented at the meeting. During the discussion it was noted that applicants require a sponsor, so in any questionable case a potential sponsor should endeavor to ascertain the applicant's qualifications and overall intent to comply with FCC regulations, particularly those related to permissible output power, before agreeing to sponsorship. It was emphasized that PVRC members do not condone use of power that exceeds the legal limits during contests. Such use is both illegal and unsportsmanlike.

An extensive discussion concerning the amount of 1987 dues followed, ending with a consensus to a) check out the Maryland Radio Center offer to pay newsletter postage costs in return for including a 1-page advertisement, and b) decide issue at November meeting so that 1) all interested memebers will have notice of the subject, & 2) a decision will be reached in time to begin collection in December, as is customary.

#### NOVEMBER MEETING

PACKET RADIO. A number of members have noted the use of packet radio in New England for a contest spotting net, and nave suggested that PVRC members may want to explore this, as with packet it is not necessary to have an operator dedicated to a two meter net, or operators interrupted to hear each report. Instead, each report is silently displayed on the CRT (or TV) screen, where it will remain until moved by later reports or by the

receiving operator. Of course, permanent hardcopy also can be obtained.

Believing that many of our members have not seen a packet system work, or are not aware of the increasingly reasonable costs of such stations, Tom WA3TAI and Lee KF3T will set up a packet station at the meeting site, demonstrate its operation, and answer questions.

DUES. At the October meeting there was substantial discussion about 1987 dues. Anticipating a substantial deficit for 1985-'86, in April we voted to establish dues at \$15. for 1987 forward. In October the treasurer's report for 1985-'86 showed a deficit of \$500, and this was only operating costs and external contest awards -- we did not have any costs for the PVRC five million award or any extraordinary expenses. With the same expenses projected for 1986-'87, the new dues would cut the deficit in half (which is being covered from a balance left over from the repeater fund).

Andy suggested that we rescind the dues increase returning to \$10. In discussion, Andy disclosed that the new Maryland Radio Center was willing to pay our newsletter postage costs in return for including a 1-page advertisement in each issue, which they would reproduce and supply. Walt is to contact the radio store to work out the details. If this can be arranged, it would result in a \$345 reduction in our 1986-87 budget expenses, leaving us with a \$155 projected deficit at \$10./year, and a \$95./projected surplus at \$15./year. Since we normally begin collecting dues in December, it is imperative that all members with an interest in this subject be at this meeting to discuss and decide this issue? We expect to know whether the radio store will commit to the newsletter arrangement by the meeting.
